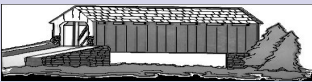

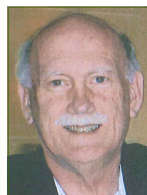

On January 15, 1915, an application for a charter was made by Tobias Ochs, George Schilling and Michael Garhart.
The first elected officers were: President L.G. Harshbarger, Vice President Michael Garhart, Secretary Tobias Ochs, Assistant Secretary August Harman, Treasurer George Schilling, Fire Chief Stephen Bucher, Assistant Chief Adam Swagart, Trustees Levi Kath, Anon Eberly and Abraham Leise.
On April 16, 1915 a horse drawn Howe fire engine was purchased for \$783.00.
A fire Hall was built in 1915 on the land of 2.14. Brunner in the alley between Main and Mechanic Streets.
In 1923 a new 3-story Fire Hall was built for \$30,000 on land purchased from Charles Clancy at the intersection of Main Street and Golen Hall Road.
In 1925, the first motor driven fire engine was purchased from Hahn for \$5,500.00.
In 1930, the company purchased the Carnival Grounds in connection with the West Cocalico School Board for \$850.00.
In 1944, the company began having carnivals.
In July 1948, a new Hahn Pumper was purchased for \$10,750.00.
In 1959, a new Ford Fire Engine was built for \$15,000.00.
In 1962, the Fire Hall was renovated for \$35,000.00.
In 1972, a new Hahn Custom pumper was purchased for \$16,995.00.
In 1976, a new Dodge Power Wagon Brush Truck was put into service.
In 1986, a new Hahn Pumper was purchased for \$146,837.00.
In 1988, the 1972 Hahn was refurbished for \$45,500.00.
In 1990, the former Reinholds Elementary School was renovated into the Banquet Hall.
In 1997, the new Fire Hall at 138 West Main Street was built for \$485,000.00 by East Penn Manufacturing was purchased for \$100,000.00.
In 2008, a new Pierce Arrow XT engine was purchased for \$435,000.00.

WOODY WASTE

WHAT IS ALLOWED AT THE SITE?

WHO: East Cocalico Township residents and property owners.

WHAT: Limbs and branches 1.5" diameter or less, and stumps that are less than 12" diameter.

WHERE: 100 Hill Rd, Denver, behind the municipal building.

WHEN: Mon. thru Fri. 8am-4:30pm., Sat. 8:00a.m.-3:00p.m., no Sundays or Holidays.

WHAT IS NOT ALLOWED AT THE SITE?

WHO: NO commercial dumping whether you live in the township or not.

NO ILLEGAL DUMPING

WHAT: NO grass, flowers, weeds, oriental grass, leaves, leaf/trash bags, furniture, clay pots, bricks, skids, stumps larger than 12" diameter (please cut down to under 12"), appliances, treated and untreated wood, picnic tables, pool tables, tires, or any other trash of this nature. **This is "illegal dumping".**

WHERE: For disposal of your "non" woody waste items, please contact: (1) your trash hauler, (2) Lanc. County Solid Waste Management Authority (LCSWMA), 717-397-9968 or visit: http://www.lcswma.org/lcswma_faqs.html. (3) www.earth911.com for a list of recycling facilities close to you by clicking on "Recycle Search", enter the name of the item to be recycled, and your zip code.

WHEN: Drop off your woody waste during the days shown above. To avoid the mud, please do not use the site during or after rainy day events.

WOODY WASTE NEEDS YOUR HELP

These pictures show trash that was recently discarded at the Township's Woody Waste site. **This is not a dump site!** These items are NOT acceptable and is *illegal dumping*. The Woody Waste Site is exactly what it is named - for "woody" waste.

The items received at the site are placed into a wood chipper: limbs and branches 1.5" in diameter or less, and stumps less than 12" in diameter.

We cannot chip or mulch weeds, or flowers from the flower garden, or vegetables from the vegetable garden, garbage bags, ornamental grass, flower pots, or any items of this nature. The site is only EPA/DEP licensed for wood only. The township could be fined for illegal dumping since the site is not set up to contain stormwater run off from grass and yard waste.

If you see someone dumping, please ask them to stop, as your tax dollars could be used more wisely and spent elsewhere than having the Township Road Crew sift through the site and pick out the unwanted and illegally dumped items.



WHAT TO DO WITH THOSE LEAVES?

MULCHING is simple, environmentally friendly, and a cost effective way to fertilize the soil. A mulching blade chops the leaves into small pieces. Start by setting your mower height and remove the bag.

COMPOSTING is another simple, environmentally friendly, and cost effective way to fertilize the soil and make natural fertilizer. To start, make a pile of leaves and mix in some grass clippings (5 to 1 ratio). Stir every two weeks or so. In the Spring you will have nutrient-rich mulch for gardens and flower beds.

BAGGING: A not-so-simple process that costs money. Leaves are placed into bags and placed out for your trash hauler. Ask your trash hauler what the pick-up days are, and costs. Kraft bags are available at the East Cocalico Township Building for the residents.

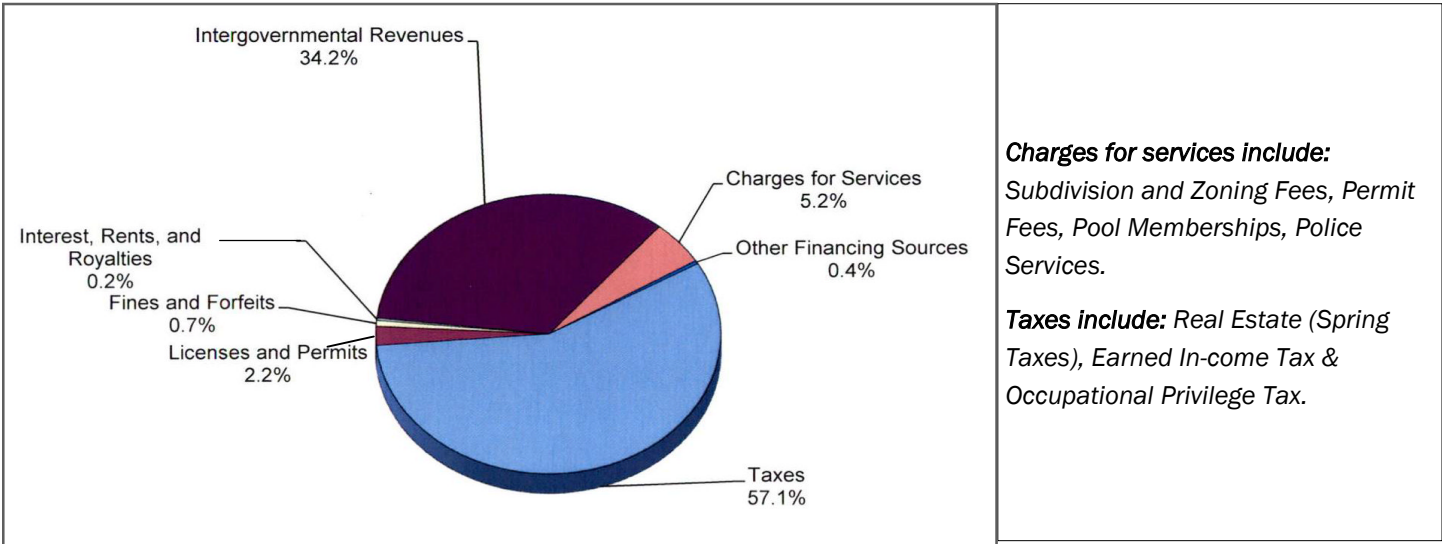

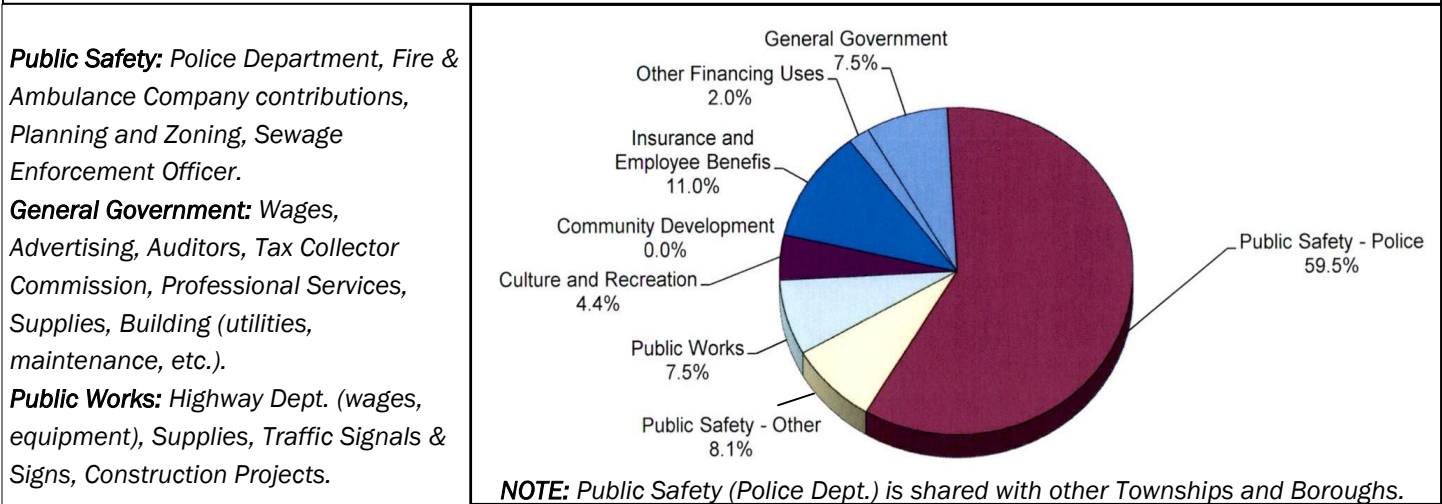

The proposed Rose Hill Development recently sold a 102-acre field as a permanent easement to the federal government for nearly \$1.3 million to keep these endangered bog turtles safe.

Previously, approximately 300 homes were planned to be built on this site.

FEMA news

East Cocalico Township appealed a proposed FEMA Floodplain along the Cocalico Creek which was larger than expected. After reviewing the township's engineering research, FEMA agreed to the appeal resulting in a 2.4 foot decrease in the flood water surface elevation and keeping several acres of land out of the more heavily-regulated Floodplain.

# Rain Check Reducing Stormwater Runoff

When the amount of rain falling exceeds the land's ability to absorb it, the result is stormwater runoff.

## Stormwater-Friendly Lawns and Gardens

Without treatment, stormwater that runs from the land into our waterways can be unhealthy for people and bad for the environment. Runoff can carry chemicals, metals, bacteria, viruses, organic compounds, and other pollutants directly into creeks, lakes, rivers, and streams. Runoff can also cause severe erosion and flooding — even during a typical Pennsylvania storm.

What can we do? Homeowners can take steps to help with the effort by making sure their gardens and lawns are “stormwater-friendly.”

**Gardens** can contribute considerable nutrients and other pollutants to waterways if not cared for responsibly. Instead of using chemical fertilizers, give organic alternatives, such as compost and manure a try.

**Insects** are harmless to people and play an important role in

maintaining a healthy lawn or garden ecosystem. If one is posing a problem, identify the exact pest and research the non-chemical alternative. Pesticides should be a last resort.

**Lawn-care** steps not only help to protect local streams and rivers but also result in cost savings for homeowners. Setting your mower

height to 3 inches or higher slows runoff and produces a deeper and denser root system, which absorbs more water and prevents erosion. Keep the grass clippings and chopped leaves, they decompose quickly providing

important nutrients for your lawn.

**Do you really need to fertilize your lawn?** If your lawn is thin or has bare spots, you may not have a choice since a dense, vegetated cover is the most stormwater-friendly lawn. There are no one-size-fits-all guidelines when it comes to fertilizer because of soil texture and pH and nutrient levels. Identifying your lawn's needs first

will reduce unnecessary applications, create a healthier lawn faster, and reduce your long-term costs. If fertilizer is needed, maximize the benefits of slow-release nitrogen, typically called “water insoluble nitrogen” or WIN, and minimize the number of chemical applications. Another tip: Homeowners should wait until the grass begins growing in March to fertilize and then stop fertilizing after October.

**Do not fertilize or use pesticides within 15 to 20 feet of a stream.** If you live near a stream, consider establishing a natural riparian buffer there instead. When you're done applying fertilizer, immediately sweep any granulated chemicals off hard surfaces.

*In the long run, little actions, such as taking a stormwater-friendly approach to your garden and lawn, will have a big impact as all of them work together to protect our water's quality.*

## what's the scoop? ←



Recently the Township was made aware of an ongoing 20,000 sq. ft. earth disturbance project on Denver Road without the appropriate permit application submission. Per DEP requirements, NO excavation or fill in of soil is permitted without a stormwater plan and a permit. Projects involving earth disturbance (a construction or other human activity which disturbs the surface of the land) of less than 1,000 sq. ft. do not require a permit. Projects involving 1,000 sq. ft. to 2,000 sq. ft. may meet the Small Projects Exemption; however, they would require an earth disturbance permit. Larger projects need a stormwater management plan and an earth disturbance permit. Please check with the Township before doing any earth disturbance activity.

## FINDING LEAKS

### SAVING MONEY

Have you ever been surprised by a higher water bill than you were expecting? During quarterly bill preparation, if Authority staff notice a property with higher than normal water use, a letter will be sent to that customer to alert them of possible problems or leaks with their home's plumbing system. Often that customer will call us asking for advice on how to check for a leak. Here are some things to look for:

- The first thing you need to do is locate the water meter in your house. The water meter in your house is a very accurate and reliable device. The only time the meter will record usage is when water is actually flowing through it and into your house. It's often found in the basement or in a garage, usually on the street side of the building. The meter will have a brass colored base and a black plastic cap.



Lift the cap and see if the red indicator or center spinner on the face of the meter is moving. If it's moving,



that means water is going through the meter and into your house.

- A good way to check for a leak is to write down the numbers you will find on the face of the water meter. Do this when no one will be in the house for a few hours or right before you go to bed. Upon returning home or getting up in the morning, immediately write down the meter's numbers again before anyone in the house uses water. The two sets of numbers should be identical. If there is any difference in the numbers, it is a good indication that there is a leak in the house.
- Toilets are by far the main culprit of most home leaks. Toilets can leak a few gallons in a 24-hour period or thousands. Over time even a few gallons

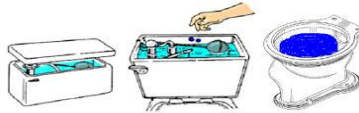
per day can be significant. Toilet leaks are often silent, and the homeowner is unaware of the water being wasted.

One way to check for a toilet leak is to



turn off the water supply valve near the floor at the back of the tank. Wait an hour and then reopen the valve. If the toilet begins to

fill, that means you have a leak. Another way to check is to put a few drops of food coloring in the tank of the toilet (where the mechanical parts are located). Do not flush the toilet. Wait an hour and then check the toilet bowl. If any of the colored water has found its way into the bowl, you most likely have a leak.



- If you have a water softener make sure it is in good repair. We have had customers report to us that their water softener failed to shut down after going through its regeneration cycle, wasting large amounts of water.
- Aging water heaters may start leaking. Check your water heater from time to time especially around the base for signs of leaking water.
- Do you have outside spigots? Make sure all outside spigots are fully closed.

If there are garden hoses attached it's especially important to turn off the water supply to the hoses when not in use.

- Do you have pipes anywhere in the house that might be leaking? This past winter was particularly cold for an extended period of time. We have had customers report that they had pipes freeze inside of walls and ceilings causing large water loss and damage.

It is a good idea to know where the water shut-off valve to your house is located. Typically it will be found where the water line enters your house, near the water meter. In an emergency you can quickly shut the water off to your house avoiding extensive damage. It is always good practice to turn off the water supply to your house if you are planning to be away for an extended period of time. We have had customers return from extended vacations only to find a water pipe broke or a toilet malfunctioned while they were gone resulting in very large water bills.

Finally, please remember that except for work directly related to the water meter, Authority personnel are not permitted to trouble shoot or repair plumbing problems inside of private homes. If you suspect a leak or locate one and can't repair it yourself please call a plumber for assistance.

## Lifestyle change?

***In addition to possible leaks, your water bill may be higher than usual because of a lifestyle change. Below is a list of some of the more common scenarios that may contribute to an increased water bill:***

*Are there new additions to the family?*

*Did you have relatives or friends staying at your house for an extended period of time?*

*Are the kids home from college?*

*Are you doing laundry or running the dishwasher more often?*

*Did you fill or top off a swimming pool in the last few months?*

*Do you have a flower or vegetable garden that you water regularly?*

*Are you washing cars or power washing driveways, sidewalks or your home?*

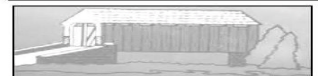
